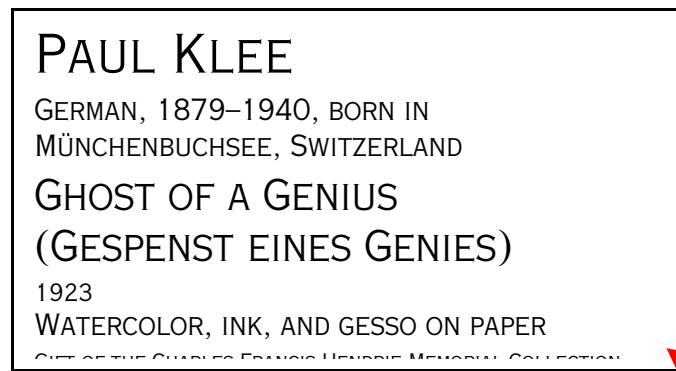


## Guidelines for college students requesting artwork-related information

We're glad that you are interested in learning more about a work of art in the Denver Art Museum collection! So that we may better accommodate your needs, please include these five things in any request for information on a work of art:

1. **Name of school, professor, and course for which you're conducting research**
2. **Title of the work of art**
3. **Artist name**
4. **Accession #:** You will find this number on the labels that accompany all works of art installed in the galleries.



5. **Your specific questions on the artwork:** While the DAM staff is not able to perform research for individuals on objects and artists in our collection, we'd be happy to answer questions that emerge in the course of your research. We will do our best to provide you with the information you seek in a timely manner, but suggest that you allow 2 weeks for a response to your request. In addition, when possible, we're happy to direct you to sources that might be of help in furthering your research.

### Other information to help you conduct your research

Creativity Resource, a website primarily designed for school teachers, might be a useful resource to you. It includes information on a number of works of art, and images that allow you to zoom in on or rotate objects to see detail.

### **Photo policy**

Photography for personal, noncommercial use is permitted unless the artwork is on loan (marked "TL" on the label, or with a number preceding the year we acquired the work- i.e. 23.1989). If you're not sure, ask a security officer. Cameras must be handheld, and the flash must be built in or attached to the camera.

### **Sketching Policy**

Feel free to sketch with pencil in notebooks 8 ½ by 11 inches or smaller. Colored pencils and ink pens are not allowed in the galleries, except in designated artmaking areas.
